

### — REGULATIONS —

The regulations of the various sports will be distributed to the National Olympic Committees after approval by the International Federations January 1939.



## OLYMPIC STADIUM

The stadium, the center of Japan's national and international sports events, is situated in the Meiji Shrine Outer Gardens, a park erected to the memory of the great Emperor of the Japanese Restoration.

This stadium will be rebuilt to become a worthy place for the XIIIth Olympiad 1940.

The plans have taken consideration of the experiences of the organizers of former Olympiads. Approximately 80,000 seats will be provided for spectators.

The reconstruction work will start during the summer of 1938 and will be prepared for the youth of the world to light the Olympic fire in 1940.

Based upon previous experiences the various events for the track and field events will be provided for as shown above.

The construction of the 400 m. track course is being planned in accord with the special climatic conditions in Japan, so that as fast and hard a track as possible may be provided for the youth of the world.

## SWIMMING STADIUM

The close connection between the Olympic and Swimming Stadiums is considered essential.

The present stadium will be enlarged to provide for 25,000 spectators. Besides the 50×25 m. pool with a filtration system, a special diving pool 18×25 m. has been provided.

The reconstruction of the pool will start in 1938 and will be finished in ample time for the XIIth Olympiad.

## FOOTBALL STADIUM

Besides the Main Football Stadium at Shiba Park, there will be several other fields constructed in the vicinity of the Main Stadium.

These will be of lawn turf with a seating capacity of about 10,000 spectators. About five different grounds will be prepared for the first and second rounds of football and for the handball competitions.

## HOCKEY STADIUM

The Main Hockey Stadium will be in Shiba Park. The stadium at Shiba Park will be used chiefly for hockey. Shiba Park, situated near the center of the city in good surroundings, has splendid communication facilities. The stadium has a lawn field, with stands which will accommodate 30,000 spectators. Other fields will be located near the Main Stadium, all of which have lawn fields and stands taking care of some 10,000 spectators.

## CYCLING STADIUM

The Cycling Stadium will be located in Shibaura near the Shinagawa Station, therefore offering excellent transportation facilities by electric car or by automobile.

The concrete track will be 500 metres and the degree of the curves will be made in accordance with the regulations. It is proposed that a very efficient track will be made. Inside the cycling track will be a lawn field with a 400 meter track. Also equipment such as the repair rooms and other personal accommodations will be carefully planned. It is equipped with a flood light system to enable the holding of night races.

The seating capacity will be about 10,000 spectators.

## TOKYO BAY



Yokohama Yacht Harbour

Yokohama, the main gateway of Japan, will become a famous yachting center of the Orient.

Tokyo Bay, adjoining the port city of Yokohama, is favoured by winds which enable local fishermen to use native sailing vessels for trawling purposes, a type of a vessel which is similar in length but faster than the six meter R-boat.

The regatta-courses are divided into four groups, namely those for the eight and six meter classes, that

for the Star class, the course for the Monotype class and a reserve course.


In the background there is majestic Mt. Fuji which can be clearly seen on fine days. From the hillside near the shore where the construction of the Olympic Home for the competitors is being planned, a commanding view of the Yacht Harbour and the courses can be had.

The harbour will shelter about three hundred boats. A crane for measuring purposes and two slipways for making repairs will be provided.

For administration and press service a clubhouse will be erected on the shore.

## OLYMPIC VILLAGE

The Tokyo Organizing Committee will follow its predecessors at Los Angeles and Berlin in building an Olympic Village, as close contacts among the sportsmen of the world proved to be of such great help in promoting international understanding.

The plans of the Olympic Village take into consideration giving foreign sportsmen an impression of the life in Japan. A place as close to the Stadium as possible will be selected, and transportation from the Village to the various sporting grounds will be provided.

Wooden houses in a semi-Japanese style with western comforts will be developed for each four inhabitants. Special dining halls and bathhouses will add to the comfort of the athletes and their trainers.

## OLYMPIC VILLAGE FOR WOMEN

For the first time the O.O.C. intends to build a special Olympic Village for the women participants near to the one for men. This will add to the new contributions of the XIIth Olympics, as the ladies will receive the same careful consideration in their village as the men.

It will be easy for trainers and officials of the various teams to carry out their duties in connection with the women participants, who will thus be living quite near their own Olympic Village.

Yachtsmen will live in Yokohama close to their regatta course, where special hotel accommodations will be provided.

## REDUCTION OF FARES

For the convenience of the participating athletes and officials for the Olympic Games, the Organizing Committee has negotiated with the various Steamship and Railway Companies, and obtained special Olympic reductions ranging from five to twenty percent. Considerable reductions are also available for round trip and through tickets, the total reductions available being as follows:





有り合せ施設でこき西辨

巨額の鐵材および木材を使用することから車懸下の問題に  
 對する懸念を生んでゐる東京オリンピック、萬博の準備問題  
 につき大藏省では近く内務省から廻付される大藏省側の  
 査定に着手する運びとなりその重要な基礎的資料を得るた  
 めに廿五日萬博地方協議長が一ツ橋の國民體育會、戸田  
 鐵のボートレース場、埼玉縣大倉公園の自動車競技場を視  
 察することになった。大藏省側としてはこの視察が建設費  
 の東大時局に影響してゐるため大藏省の側面に對する鐵材  
 木材削減の要請から出来るだけ鐵材の削減と利用せしめん  
 とする意向であるがオリンピックに對する廻り組構を以て  
 前には建設費削減の代用には建設費削減の意向が有らな  
 るので建設費削減を要請されてゐる。カサトは東京市臨時  
 建築部が作成した臨時建築費動向と組織に據るべき建築


